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

As we ring in the new year 2024, we welcome you to join in our 65-course offerings for the winter term beginning February 4 and wrapping up just after Easter in early April.

Our committee began to prepare this menu of courses back in August so as to meet the many deadlines throughout the fall term. First and foremost, there are six subject coordinators who find experienced and willing course leaders in their particular subject: Arts and Music; History and Social Science; Language and Literature; Science, Math and Computers; Health and Wellness; and Eclectic. Information is gathered and the course title and descriptions are refined before the data manager reviews and records the information in a comprehensive spreadsheet. Good communication skills and an attention to detail keep the work moving along.

At the same time, another team is working on the lecture series, which involves generating a theme and then finding key people who are willing to donate their time to give us a two-hour lecture on a Saturday morning. All in all, we have six exciting lectures and 34 new courses for you to taste, which speaks to the commitment of our committee members to bring freshness to the program.

Behind the scenes, the staff at North Island College (NIC) have scheduled the courses according to the availability of rooms and the course leaders' wishes. The information is added to the registration system and put up on the website. At the same time, the Communication Committee is preparing the printed course guide so that it is ready to hit the streets in early January. Next comes the planning for the Course Information Forum on Saturday, January 20 in which course leaders provide a taste of their course to come.

Remembering Mary Elizabeth Smith

It is with heavy hearts that we acknowledge the passing of Mary Elizabeth Smith, founding member of Comox Valley ElderCollege (CVEC). Through her vision and efforts, and those of her close friend and fellow CVEC founder Betty Emery, Comox Valley ElderCollege has grown from the germ of an idea into a robust continuous learning organization that brings purpose and enjoyment to seniors in the Comox Valley.

In 1999, the two friends first dreamed of a local lifelong learning program that would enrich the lives of seniors. They presented the concept of ElderCollege to the president of NIC, who readily embraced the idea and agreed to provide classroom accommodation and registration assistance. The first CVEC semester launched in the fall of 1999 with roughly a dozen courses and a lecture series entitled *Age Makes a Difference*.

In the 24 years since Elizabeth Smith and Betty Emery founded Comox Valley ElderCollege, course offerings and membership have grown substantially. Today, CVEC continues to support three NIC bursaries, including the Elizabeth Smith and the Betty Emery Founders Bursaries, which are awarded annually to three NIC students studying in a field that relates to working with older persons.

All members of Comox Valley ElderCollege owe a debt of gratitude to Elizabeth Smith for acting upon her vision to enrich the lives of seniors. Our hearts go out to Elizabeth's family and all who loved her.
