



VIRTUAL FIELD SCHOOL, PACIFIC RIM CONNECTIONS IN COSTA RICA

NIC began a partnership with Tecnológico de Costa Rica to deliver an Indigenous student virtual exchange. The result was a strong foundation for further Indigenous cultural/community relationships and exchanges.

INDIGENOUS LANGUAGE FLUENCY FIELD SCHOOL IN HAWAII

This field school was a collaboration between NIC's Indigenous Language Fluency Certificate and Kapi'olani Community College in Honolulu. Students from the Kwakwala cohort were invited to attend the field school and spend 10 days in Honolulu. During that time, NIC Kwakwaka'wakw students shared language learning experiences and engaged in a cultural exchange with our Hawaiian hosts.

SCHOLARS PROGRAM

The North Island College Aboriginal Scholars program is a holistic and culturallyrelevant program to support you.

HOW IT WORKS

Work with Indigenous supports to create an achievement plan based on your goals. They can be academic, spiritual, emotional and/or physical.

You'll work with your support people throughout the term to keep on track and also access services that will help you achieve your goals.

Apply for one term or the entire academic year. At the end of each successful term, you can earn a \$250 scholarship.

Examples of support include study skills, faculty meetings, Elders in Residence, community events, physical activities, financial aid and bursaries.

Part of my success in the past semester has been due to the support through the Aboriginal Scholars program. I have grown so much in the last year and realized school is a stablizing force in my life. I have come to find some joy and peace in my education and have enjoyed the connection from the Indigenous education team and the Scholars program.

SELFDECLARE YOUR INDIGENOUS ANCESTRY

We encourage you to declare your Indigenous ancestry. No proof of ancestry is required. You can declare when you apply or after you become a student.

WHY SELF-IDENTIFY?

- You're helping to identify how many Indigenous students attend NIC.
- Gain access to information on awards, scholarships and bursaries, as well as programs, supports and services.
- Gain access to Priority
 Admission on select Health and
 Human Service programs.

To be considered for a priority admission seat, Indigenous students must:

- Meet NIC's general admission requirements and specific program requirements.
- Declare ancestry and intent to access priority seating with an Indigenous Education Navigator.

FUNDING MY EDUCATION

Did you know that you may be eligible for sponsorship or support that will help cover the cost of your education? Reach out to your Indigenous Education Navigator if you need help understanding any of these resources.



NATION OR BAND FUNDING

Some Bands and Nations have funding to support your education. Generally the Education Coordinator at your Band or Nation office can help you with this. If you are usure where to start please connect with your Indigenous Education Navigator.

MÉTIS NATION FUNDING

Métis students may be eligible to apply for support through Métis Nation BC. Please be aware of processing times and a thorough application.

INDIGENOUS ORGANIZATION FUNDING

Financial assistance may be available to you while in short or long-term training and school, including tuition, books, safety tickets, personal protection equipment, tools and sometimes childcare, travel and living expenses (e.g., NVIATS, NETP).

EXTERNAL SCHOLARSHIPS & BURSARIES

Bursaries are available through a variety of organizations including unions and employee groups, employers, non-profit, provincial and federal organizations (e.g., Indspire,

Irving K. Barber Awards, New Relationship Trust).

NIC FOUNDATION AWARDS

As a new or continuing student, you're eligible to apply for hundreds of scholarships and bursaries to help pay for college. Applications are open for a limited time starting in March.

STUDENT AID:

Help with the cost of post-secondary education through student loans and grants.

EMERGENCY FUNDS

If you face unexpected financial hardships while attending NIC, you can meet with an Indigenous Education Navigator or Financial Aid Advisor to arrange access to emergency funding.

PLEASE NOTE

- All sources of funding may have limited resources and each may have their own deadlines and eligibility requirements. Connect directly with the fund holder for more details.
- Many agencies and organizations outside of the ones listed here may have resources available to you.
 Reach out to your Indigenous Education Navigator or Financial Aid Advisor to discuss your options.

NIC LINGO

BECOMING A STUDENT

APPLICATION

Your formal submission of interest, either online or by paper, for a particular program.

ADMISSION REQUIREMENTS

The requirements you need to meet in order to enter the program you're applying to. Requirements vary by program.

COURSE PRE-REQUISITE(S)

A course(s) that's required before another course can be taken.

TRANSCRIPT

An official, permanent record of the number of courses you've completed and your marks in those courses. Official transcripts must be ordered from your institution, with the cost paid by the student. You can access unofficial transcripts through your myNIC account.

PLACEMENT ASSESSMENT

NIC accepts English and Math placement tests in lieu of transcripts. You can either provide a high school transcript or take a placement test to ensure that you have the necessary English and/or math skills for your studies.

INVITATION

Being accepted into a program after the requirements for entering the program have been met. For most NIC programs, you're invited on a first-qualified, first-invited basis.

TUITION DEPOSIT

A non-refundable tuition deposit paid prior to registration. After you've registered, your deposit will go towards the tuition you owe. Tuition-free courses/program do not require a tuition deposit.

REGISTRATION

Signing up for a specific section of a course to reserve your seat.

WHEN YOU'RE A STUDENT

ACADEMIC CALENDAR

A full list of NIC courses.

ACADEMIC SCHEDULES AND DEADLINES

A summary of dates and deadlines that affect students.

ADD/DROP

The period of time at the beginning of each semester when you can change the courses you're registered for without a penalty.



GRADE POINT

The value of your final mark in a course rated on a scale between 0 and 4.33.

GRADE POINT AVERAGE (GPA)

GPA is the value of each course final mark multiplied by the credit value of each course, divided by the number of courses taken.

PART-TIME AND FULL-TIME STATUS

Refers to the number of credit hours you're enrolled in each semester. You're considered full-time when you're enrolled in nine or more credit hours. When you're registered with the Department of Accessible Learning, you're considered full-time if you're registered in six or more credit hours.







SEMESTER/TERM

The divisions of the academic year. NIC has three terms:

- Fall September to December
- Winter January to April
- Spring/Summer May to August Note: from May to August, you can register in classes that run in just Spring (seven weeks), just Summer (seven weeks) or throughout the Spring/Summer term (14 weeks)

TIMETABLE

Shows you which courses are currently scheduled.

WITHDRAWAL DEADLINE

The latest possible dates to withdraw from a class without it affecting your grade point average (GPA). A "W" will show on your transcript, but that course will not be used in the calculation of your grade point average.

COLLEGE CREDENTIALS

CREDENTIAL

The official document you receive when you complete an academic program.

CERTIFICATE

A credential of 30 credit hours, usually completed in one year. Trades foundation programs are included in this category.

DIPLOMA

A credential of 60 credit hours, which can be completed in two years of full-time study.

DEGREE

An undergraduate degree of 120 credit hours, which can be completed in four years of full-time study (also known as a bachelor's degree).

TRADES FOUNDATION

A Trades program that covers the basic knowledge and skills to start workingin a specific trade. Level 1 of apprenticeship training is sometimes included. An employer sponsor is not required.

TRADES APPRENTICESHIP TRAINING

A combination of on-the-job and in-school training. Apprentices need an employer sponsor to complete their apprenticeship levels. The in-school training lasts 4-10 weeks, depending on the trade.

NOTE: Most programs don't have an application deadline and operate on a 'first applied, first qualified, first invited' system — so the sooner you apply, the better!

Sign up to educationplannerbc.ca, fill out your application and pay the \$25 fee.

We'll send confirmation of your application to your personal email address.

ACTIVATE YOUR MYNIC ACCOUNT

Log in to mynic.nic. bc.ca with the username and password in your confirmation email.

4 SUBMIT YOUR TRANSCRIPTS

Upload your official transcripts and any other documents required for your program.

5 CHECK YOUR MYNIC ACCOUNT FOR YOUR OFFER OF ADMISSION

Accept your offer and pay your tuition deposit.

6 REGISTER FOR YOUR COURSES

Choose courses in self-service in your myNIC account.
