Executive Message

As I was walking across campus for my class, I thought about the upcoming CVEC 25th anniversary in 2024. This led me to reflect upon the first 24 years of the partnership between CVEC and North Island College (NIC). As CVEC members, we have enjoyed many benefits.

First among these is access to such a beautiful academic setting. The architecture complements the natural beauty of the campus. This year we also witnessed the clearing of the land for the impressive residential complex. In addition, we have well-equipped classrooms, the use of the Stan Hagen theatre, the cafeteria and the Learning Commons (i.e. library). From the tots at the Beaufort Children's Centre, to our CVEC members and all the students in between, the Comox Valley campus is truly a community of life-long learners.

Second is the administrative support that we receive from the staff and senior management of NIC. They provide registration services, financial services, the scheduling of courses as well as the assignment of classrooms. NIC also provides the part-time services of a liaison who acts a conduit between CVEC and NIC.

Third, NIC provides a gathering spot for socializing. Zoom classes helped CVEC to stay operational throughout the pandemic and continue to be beneficial where the instructor or the lecture presenter is in a remote location; however, they could not provide the opportunities for socializing that on-campus courses did. For many of our members, socializing is a prime motivator. Our instructors also welcome the in-person interaction with their participants.

Aside from appreciating all that NIC offers CVEC members, we can also take pride in what we give back. First and foremost are the three bursaries that are awarded yearly to NIC students. Two of the bursaries are named for our two founders, Elizabeth Smith and Betty Emery. The third bursary was established in 2019 to commemorate the 20th anniversary of CVEC.

Over the years, CVEC has underwritten a number of physical upgrades to the Stan Hagen Theatre. The first of these was the installation of railings for the stairs. More recently, CVEC has provided an upgrade to the theatre's audio system.

NIC also benefits financially as 50% of CVEC revenues are provided as payment for the services that NIC provides. NIC's funding from the BC Government is based on full time equivalents (number of bodies in the seats) and CVEC members contribute to NIC's total count.

From a humble beginning where the first semester saw an offering of four classes and a CVEC membership of 100, CVEC now boasts a membership of nearly 1,000 and a course offering exceeding 50 courses. Certainly, much of CVEC's success can be attributed to its many selfless volunteers; however, we have to credit the symbiotic partnership with NIC as being a very important contributing factor.

Car Care

(3 weeks on campus) Instructor: Donald Skogstad



Drawing on his extensive experience with over 100 cars, comprising 20 manufacturers, eight on-road breakdowns, and

several upgrade projects, Don will take you from one end of the vehicle to the other and guide you from headlights to exhaust systems. This course will help in purchasing, maintaining, or upgrading a car. It's part physics, part automotive mechanics, and part YouTube with anecdotes from Don's considerable experience gained over the years.

Evidence of Life After Death

(6 weeks on campus) Instructor: Phyllis Chubb

The results from the revival of large numbers of heart and surgical patients have been a driving force in lifeafter-death research. Where have ideas about death originated? What are some explanations for death? How can death be understood? Why is doubt arising? What does current research tell us?

To answer these questions, the effect of alternative world views will be presented.



From Script to Screen

(4 weeks on campus) Instructor: Larry Bambrick

Take a visual trip with a TV producer and explore the fascinating world of scripted television shows. Using real-life examples from shows he's worked on from CTV to the Hallmark Channel, the instructor will help participants understand exactly how an idea for a show becomes the episode you watch at home. From writing and casting to shooting and editing, you will learn to look at your favourite show in a new way.

What is Scientific Literacy?

(4 weeks on campus) Instructor: Roderick Montague

This is NOT primarily a science course where a large body of scientific information gets presented. The aim, rather, is to provide the tools



needed for understanding and evaluating the scientific information we encounter each day. In essence, it is answering the question, "Should I trust what I am being told or am I being sold snake oil?"


