Notes from the Volunteer Support Committee

A Fireside Chat by Email

We asked the current retiring chairs and co-chairs of the five standing committees for their reflections on their experience and the benefits of volunteering. Here's a summary of what they had to say.

What attracted you to joining your committee?

"...a chance to help out in an endeavour which offers a worthwhile opportunity to a specific age group..."

"I thought I might be able to provide assistance. I had produced many communications in my

career."

"As it turned out, my work experience and interests have been a good fit for the 'behind the scenes' work that is required to manage a program like ElderCollege."

"Already being a fan and user of adult education, I was attracted by the opportunity to influence the range of courses we could offer."

What do you consider to be the key requisites for a chair or co-chair position?

"Being a team player; the capacity to listen, share ideas..."

"Flexibility, open to change and an ability to appreciate the efforts of others..."

"The ability to coordinate, to see the big picture, to motivate others and be flexible."

"Managing deadlines, chairing meetings, being adaptable and supporting colleagues."

What fuels your enthusiasm and commitment?

"My volunteer work with CVEC has given me a focus in retirement... the satisfaction from playing some small part behind the scenes to bring joy and a sense of belonging to so many of our members."

"I still get enthusiastic when a new instructor (or volunteer) with a lot to offer comes our way." "The satisfaction of a job well done as measured by positive feedback and strong member engagement. Also, the implementation of online courses and communication has been invigorating."

"Volunteering for an organization that is held in high esteem within our community; being an enabler for adult education."

When things get bumpy or challenging, what's helped you get through it?

"Losing key committee members creates a challenge, especially if there is no one to fill in until a replacement is found. Good support from committee and executive members as well as NIC helps keep up motivation."

"The support and encouragement of committee colleagues. You're never left to fend for yourself."

"...having committee members who often step up to fill a gap helps a lot. The switch from live to virtual classes has created new challenges... but support for each other has helped." "No volunteer stands alone. I draw on the wisdom, experience, and support of the rest of the CVEC team – past and present. They have always been there for me."

We hope these reflections might inspire you to consider taking on one of the co-chair positions listed below. If you are thinking, "What, chair a committee? I'm not sure I could take that on," we currently have a co-chair who had no previous experience with ElderCollege and his positive comments are part of the summary above.



Co-Chair, or Chair & Vice Chair, Finance and Administration Committee

You and your team facilitate the development of CVEC policy and participate in strategic planning. Please do not let the Finance area deter you. This is currently being well taken care of.

Co-Chairs, or Chair & Vice Chair, Member Support Committee

You and your team host activities that provide a friendly atmosphere for all members of ElderCollege. For example, welcoming members to Saturday lectures, handling sign-in and providing refreshments.

Co-Chair, Communications Committee

You and your team promote the mission of ElderCollege both within the membership and in the wider community. For example, writing articles for either online or print publications such as the ElderCollege Connector and The Comox Valley Record.

If you think a co-chair position is still a bridge too far, please consider one of the following roles.

Subject Coordinator, Curriculum Committee

You act as the primary point of contact for course leaders in a designated subject area with respect to completion and submission of course data for publication.

Secretary, Volunteer Support Committee

The Volunteer Support Committee seeks out new volunteers and refers them to appropriate committee chairs. The secretary prepares the minutes of meetings, forwards them to the chairs for approval, and subsequently distributes them to the committee members.

Members-at-Large

Consider becoming a member-at-large on one of ElderCollege's five standing committees: Communications, Curriculum, Finance and Administration, Member Support, or Volunteer Support. A great way to find out about that committee and find your fit.

Zoom Technical Support, Curriculum Committee

You will demonstrate/teach core Zoom skills to course leaders as they move to provide online instruction.
