Comox Valley

Campbell River

Campbell River has been dubbed the 'Salmon Fishing Capital of Canada' and is a 40 minute drive north of the Comox Valley by car. Campbell River is known for its friendly residents and easy access to outdoor adventures.

Port Alberni

Port Alberni is a port city in the centre of Vancouver Island, 1 ½ hours southwest of the Comox Valley. The community is linked to forestry, fishing and marine commercial industries. Its central location makes it easy to explore tourist destinations such as Tofino and the West Coast.

Connect with Local Employers

Co-operative education and internships

Co-operative education combines academic studies with paid, practical experience. As a co-op student you will alternate between periods of full-time study and periods of full-time paid work experience.

Internship students gain valuable work experience and on-the-job training related to their field of study. Some internships are paid positions, while others are unpaid.

What's the difference? Co-op work terms take place over four months periods, and are full-time, paid positions.

Internships take from 180 to 360 hours, and can be full or part-time, paid or unpaid.

Off-campus employment

Many businesses near the college regularly hire NIC students. Your study permit may allow you to work up to 20 hours/week during regular academic sessions and full-time during winter and summer holidays.

Industry relevant research

Many NIC programs regularly bring industry experts into the classroom to connect students and employers. From biology students researching the distribution of eelgrass beds as part of a nationally-funded research project, to industrial automation students revolutionizing the way sparkling wine is manufactured, students participate in hands-on research that demonstrates their ability to solve challenges confronted by industry.

Employment resources

NIC's annual career fair and other networking events allow you to explore potential career paths and connect with employers during your school year. NIC's Student Employment Services hosts employer panels, workshops and mock interviews with real employers. If you need help with interview, resume and job search strategies, support is available.

Payment and deadlines

You are required to submit your first term fees no later than 30 days after the date on your Letter of Invitation from NIC. Tuition and fees may be paid by certified cheque in Canadian funds, credit card, Canadian postal money order or bank wire.

Entrance awards available

NIC offers entrance awards for applicants with high levels of English language proficiency. All applicants are automatically reviewed for this award, therefore no award application is required.

Students in receipt of this award will be notified upon enrollment.

Apply for scholarships and bursaries

As a new or continuing NIC student, you are eligible to apply for scholarships and bursaries to help fund your education. Bursaries are based on financial need, while scholarships are awarded for academic achievement and excellence. The application deadline is April 30 each year.

Work off-campus

If you are a full-time student in an academic program with a valid student permit, you may qualify to work up to 20 hours per week off-campus. You'll find information on employment opportunities on NIC's Employment Resource Centre Job Board.

Affordable entertainment

It is relatively inexpensive to live in the Comox Valley. A cup of coffee costs from \$2 to \$5. Dinner out ranges from \$15 to \$50 per person. Going to a movie costs \$14 or you can head to the skating rink or local pool for a student rate of less than \$4 per person.



Accommodation

Find your home away from home

Having a comfortable place to live while you study is essential. It is important to plan where you live ahead of time so you know where you are staying when you arrive. If you choose homestay or peerstay, you will live with a host family. They will help you learn about the community and culture on Vancouver Island, include you in family activities and offer lots of opportunity for you to practise English.

Homestay

Homestay is the most popular choice for new international students. It includes a fully furnished private room with laundry facilities, access to internet and three meals a day.

Peerstay

Peerstay is similar to homestay except students buy their own groceries and cook their own meals. Your host can help you with information or assistance. This is a good choice if you want more flexibility or you prefer a specific kind of food.

Bridge easily into academic programs

Academic English Language Program



Start: Sep, Oct*, Jan, Feb*, May, Jun*
* *Mid-term entry (Please note: mid-term entry students will be examined on full content for that term or can choose to audit the course and then repeat the following term for credit.*

Length: Two and four-month sessions

You need: You will be assessed by an English Language Program faculty member to determine course level for registration. Students who have an IELTS or TOEFL iBT score will be eligible for pre-placement and registration

You'll learn: Build confidence and achieve a high level of English fluency with a focus on preparing for university/college programs.

Start at the right level for you.

Whether you are trying to improve your career options or meet university entrance requirements, we can help. You will progress through the program by skill level to reach your personal goals.

Upgrading (Adult Basic Education)



Start: Sep to Jun, scheduled courses and continuous entry

Length: Four-month sessions

You need: to take a NIC assessment to determine your basic English proficiency, TOEFL or ILETS are not required. Assessment can be completed upon arrival. If you don't meet the basic English proficiency refer to the Academic English Language program.

You'll learn: Meet university and college admission requirements. NIC offers all high school levels up to Grade 12 in the following subjects:



How it works?

Each degree pathway has its own unique deadlines and transfer requirements:

UVic Guaranteed Admission
Achieve a 2.0 GPA (C average) or higher in eight or more eligible courses (24 transfer credits) and UVic will guarantee your admission to select programs. (See UVic Engineering Guaranteed Admission below.)

UVic Engineering Guaranteed Admission
Achieve a minimum GPA of 2.33 (C+ average and no courses less than C) to guarantee your admission into second-year Computer, Electrical, Mechanical, Biomedical, Civil or Software Engineering.

VIU Guaranteed Admission
Achieve a 2.0 GPA (C average) or higher in eight or more eligible courses (24 transfer credits) and VIU will guarantee your admission to select programs.

UNBC Dual Admission
As a dual admission student, your admission is confirmed to UNBC and NIC at the start of your education. Complete two years of eligible classes at NIC and then transfer into Year 3 of UNBC's Bachelor of Science.

Royal Roads Dual Admission
As a dual admission student, your admission is confirmed to Royal Roads and NIC at the start of your education. Upon completion of designated courses and programs you will automatically move into Year 3 of select programs

Emily Carr University of Art + Design Guaranteed Admission
Complete NIC's Fine Arts diploma with a GPA of 3.0 or higher and you can automatically transfer into Year 3 of a Bachelor of Fine Arts or Bachelor of Design.

Alberta College of Art + Design
Complete NIC's Fine Arts diploma with an average of C (2.0) or higher and you can automatically transfer into Year 3 of a Bachelor of Fine Arts on the basis of academic standing and portfolio review.





How to Apply

Apply to NIC in two easy steps.

Once you have chosen your program, determine your eligibility by reviewing the admission requirements. Then, simply gather the necessary information and prepare to apply in just two easy steps.

1 Submit an application

To qualify for admission to North Island College you must meet the following requirements – Applicant must:

1. Be 18 years of age or older within the calendar year in which they are applying to study.
(Consideration may be given for younger students who have completed high school and meet all other admission requirements.)
2. Meet other academic and admission requirements for your chosen program. Full admission requirements are found under each program description.
3. Meet the minimum Academic English language requirement by completing one of:
 - NIC Academic English Language Program; or
 - BC Grade 12 English C(+); or
 - CAEL 60 and writing 60; or
 - IELTS 6.0 no band below 5.5; or
 - TOEFL iBT 80 no section below 19; or
 - TOEFL 550 (Code 8538); or
 - PTE Academic minimum 54 with no component below 46.

2 Submit supporting documents

- personal contact information
- copy of passport with signature page
- high school transcripts
- post-secondary transcripts from all post-secondary institutions you've attended
- post-secondary credentials (certificate, diploma, degree, etc.)
- official language proficiency scores
- supplemental information required by your program.

Once you have received your Letter of Acceptance from North Island College, you can apply for a study permit. For more information on study permit requirements to study in Canada, visit www.cic.gc.ca.
