Where is Here: Small Cities, Deep Mapping and Sustainable Futures

It was a creative, productive and busy summer for the NIC School of Fine Art and Design. Our department was a successful co-applicant for a Social Sciences & Humanities Research Council (SSHRC) Connections Grant.

Where is Here: Small Cities, Deep Mapping and Sustainable Futures is a Mapping Project and Symposium that seizes on the tremendous interest shown in cultural mapping practices by small cities and brings to bear multiple knowledge domains to move our collective understanding of this practice forward.

The project was a collaborative effort that brings together the work of several institutions: Vancouver Island University, North Island College, Thompson Rivers University, University of British Columbia (Okanagan) and Comox Valley Art Gallery.

The symposium took place in the Comox Valley, July 20 - 22, 2016.

This 3-day event brought together over 25 cultural mapping specialists from Canada and beyond to reflect on current practice, exchange knowledge and innovate within the field. Presenters included municipal development actors, academics and artists. The event had keynote speakers, panel discussions and art interventions.

NIC faculty member, Sara Vipond, gave a panel talk at the symposium, her talk was titled *Re-positioning* a Sense of Place: Contemporary Artists Cultivate, Retaliate, Respond.

NIC's Contribution

The School participated in the SSHRC Project on five levels:

- 1. Artists-in-Residence Program: This residency program was a collaborative partnership with NIC School of Fine Art & Design, Comox Valley Art Gallery, and the McLoughlin Gardens AIR residence. The three artists, Clive Powsey, Joanne Bristol and Barbara Meneley had access to NIC studios, MAC labs and production equipment while the Comox Valley Art Gallery featured their work in an exhibition titled, *MAP: MAKE / ART / PLACE*. Meleney and Bristol stayed at the McLoughlin Gardens, which provided the visiting artists with accommodation in a charming waterfront cabin near Merville, BC.
- 2. **Specifically Designed Studio Course:** This course titled: *Walking as Mapping* included, ECU, NIC students, Artist-in-Residence, Clive Powsey and four NIC Faculty members.
- 3. Artist Talks by Artists-in-Residence: Each artist gave a talk and the School would like to thank the NIC Foundation for their monetary contribution.

- 4. Art Exhibition: *Walking as Mapping: A Creative Laboratory* was held in the Shadbolt Studios, July 19 27.
- 5. Talk, Walk and Make Event: A post-symposium Art Talk & Activities were held at NIC and Mount Washington).

HEALTH AND HUMAN SERVICES

Faculty Update

The Faculty of Health and Human Services received funding from the Ministry of Advanced Education (MAVED) to support the one-time delivery of 20 additional FTEs in the Pre-Health Block followed by 10 seats in a Health Care Assistant program in partnership with the Nuu-Chah-Nulth Tribal Council.

This unique pilot offering will include a program elder-in-residence, cultural curriculum, and elder teachings and will be offered at the Port Alberni campus starting October 4, 2016.

Additional funds were also identified by MAVED to offer a pilot partnership Community Mental Health Worker program with the Nuu-Chah-Nulth Tribal Council for 10 students at Port Alberni campus starting in September 2017. Development of this program will start fall 2016.

In-community programming continues for both the Early Childhood Care and Education Certificate in Ahousaht and the Education Assistant/Community Support Worker Certificate at the Mount Waddington campus. In June, the Early Childhood Care and Education department also offered an ECCE course in a condensed format at the Mount Waddington campus to ensure enough certified Assistants in the region for the sustainability of two First Nations childcare centers. With great celebration, thirteen students started the course and twelve completed resulting in an additional dozen certified assistants in the Mount Waddington region. The department is also planning to offer a course with the Zeballos community starting October 20, 2016. Demand for this offering is strong with twenty interested community members.

Due to the additional one-time-only funds that were received from MAVED in spring 2016, the Health Care Assistant Department was able to increase the Comox Valley fall and winter cohort enrolments each by ten seats. The Health Care Assistant department continues to develop some online courses to increase access and choice for future students. A review of the curriculum was also recently completed regarding recommendations to weave Aboriginal ways of knowing and being into the curriculum and include Elders' teachings in the program.

Practical Nursing will start a feasibility study this fall to determine alternative delivery formats and the opportunity to offer a multi-campus annual intake (current alternating intakes annually between Port Alberni and Campbell River).

With great success, the Social Service Worker diploma is piloting an increased number of seats this fall to address community interest and demand. Curriculum revisions also continue in the Indigenous Education Assistant/Community Support program to reflect a more inclusive curriculum that embraces multiple ways of knowing and being into the content, assignments, and evaluative processes. It is anticipated that these revisions will go through the appropriate approval processes in the coming academic year.

Our Bachelor of Science in Nursing program implemented a selective entry admission process for the first time this fall. Further work is underway by the faculty this fall to explore and develop a first year health promotion component of our Aboriginal field school.

In closing, I want to acknowledge the commitment and work that all of faculty have contributed to ensure the aforementioned achievements have come to fruition. These celebrations would not be possible without their dedication to our communities and our students' success.


